Another fundraiser we are participating in is the collection of used cell phones that we can get \$7 each for and donate that to charities and scholarships.

The Optimist recently asked the Bixby Rotary Club to take over the Bixby Christmas Parade which to us sounded like a changing of the guard in our community.

The Bixby BBQ'n Blues Festival 2003 will be held on May 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> in Washington Irving Memorial Park at 148<sup>th</sup> and S. Memorial.
