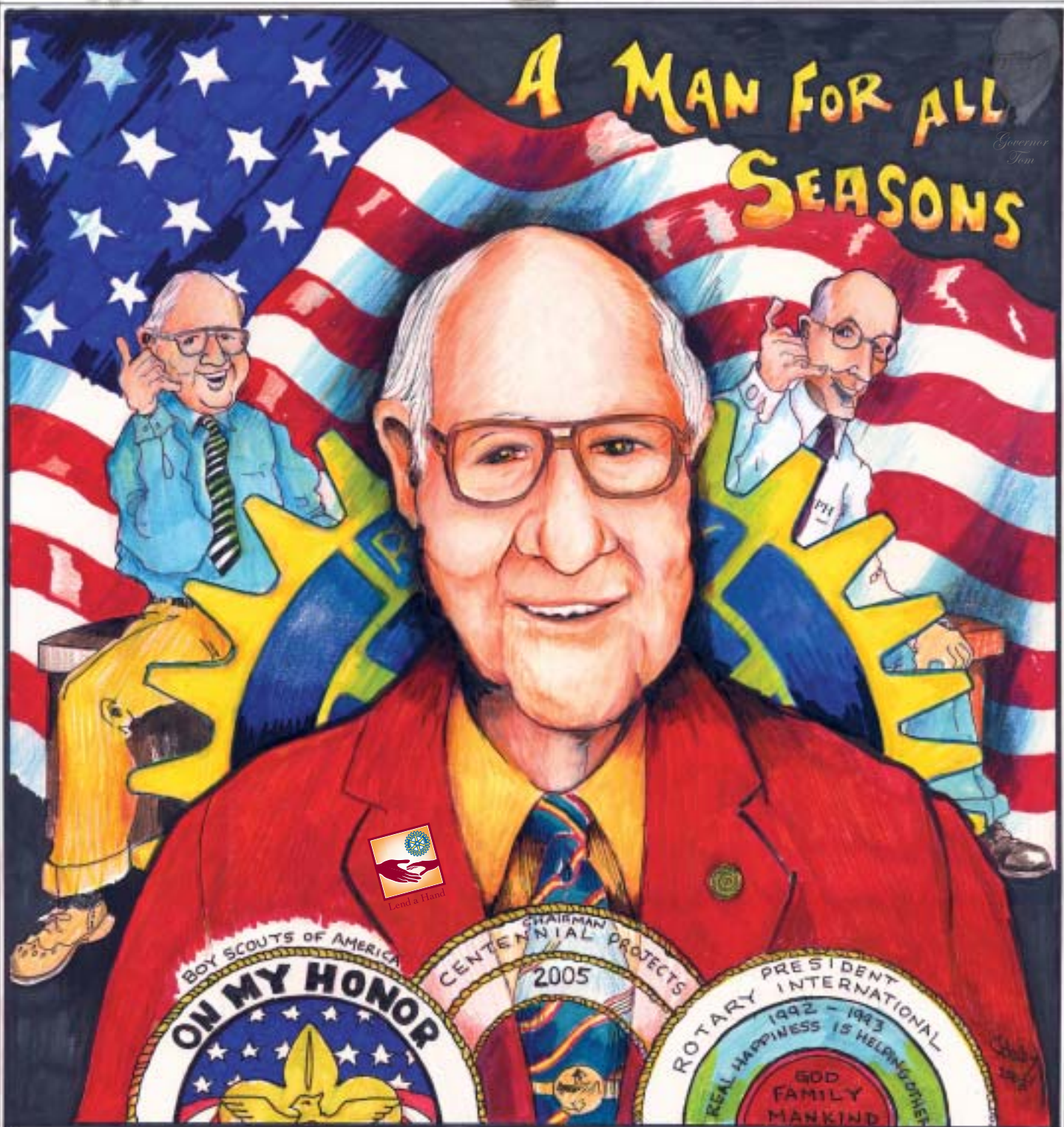

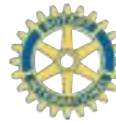

# Real Happiness

The following is an excerpt from, "Why I Joined Rotary" speech given by Stephen T. Lee, Rotarian at the 93rd Rotary International Convention in Barcelona, Spain on Monday, 24 June, 2002.

"If we are to be an organization that is relevant in this day and age, then we must be the sum total of people with visions. As I heard past RI President **Cliff Dochterman** tell us, people of microscopic visions and people of telescopic visions, each contributing to the whole."

Friday Noon, November 7, 2003 could be one of the major moments in your Rotary career. District 6110 is proud to present, "**Mr. Rotary**" **Cliff Dochterman!**

Rotary's 1992-93 President, Cliff brings a lifelong commitment to service. He is a Rotary Pioneer, and dedicates his life to Rotary Service, making countless speaking engagements around the world.

From the July 1992 *Rotarian* magazine, in an article written by R. Doyle Minden, "... He doesn't seek personal credit. It is one of the characteristics he brings to the 1992-93 leadership of Rotary International..." This still holds true today. Cliffs says, "You can achieve almost anything if you're not looking for personal credit. You can plan, create, and build for the future."

Some of Cliff Dochterman's Rotary Legacy:

- In 1984, **Rotary International** presented him with the **DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD** for his work as one of the three architects of the **Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Program**. This program led to Rotary's **Polio-Plus** project.
- Served as Chairman of the R.I. **New Horizons Committee**, **Strategic Planning Committee**, **Planning and Research Committee** and **The 21st Century Committee**.
- Wrote and updated *The ABC's of Rotary*, a compact guide telling Rotary's history, customs and traditions.

- On January 25, 2003 — Cliff was in the spotlight on ESPN television — publicizing Rotary's **Polio-Plus** project at the **Rotary Gridiron Classic All-Star** football game, held at the **Florida Citrus Bowl** in Orlando, Florida.
- Currently Cliff is **Chairman of 2005 World-Wide Rotary Centennial Projects** committee.

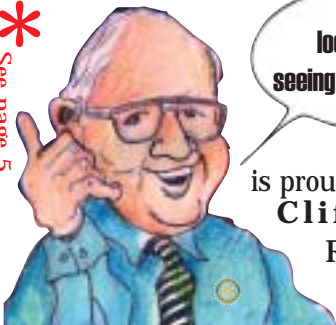
Cliff joined the **Rotary Club of Berkeley, CA** in 1958 and became its president in 1964. Four years later he was **Governor of District 5160**. According to the July 1992 *Rotarian*, Cliff attributes much of his philosophy for service to his **Midwestern roots** in **Findley and Delaware, Ohio**. It was there that Cliff began a life-long involvement with the **Boy Scouts**, and where he became the **youngest Eagle Scout** in the **United States** at the age of 13.

The **Boy Scouts of America** have been a major part of Cliff's life for more than 60 years. He continues to serve and develop individual scouts today. From 1975 to 1977 he was the president of the **Central California 49er Council of the Boy Scouts of America**, and became a national leader at the 1979 and 1981 **Scout Jamborees**. He has received Scouting's highest recognition (the **SILVER BEAVER**, the **SILVER ANTELOPE**, and the **DISTINGUISHED EAGLE AWARDS**) for his dedication to service.

Cliff graduated with Honors from **Ohio Wesleyan University** with a degree in political science. Cliff migrated to **California** to attend **Law School** at the **University of California - Berkeley**. There he decided pursuing a master's degree in **personnel administration** would be more interesting. In 1959 Cliff became an assistant to **Clark Kerr**, President of the **University of California**, and one of the most respected leaders of higher education.

The **Berkeley campus** was at the center of controversy during the **turbulent 60's** and Cliff often had the unenviable task of smoothing out tension between students, faculty and the **statewide community**.

In 1972 Stanley E. McCafferty — who would become R.I. President in 1980-81 — became president of the **University of the Pacific** in Stockton, California. Stan asked Cliff to serve as vice-president. Over his 18 years there, he and Stan created a beautiful “Ivy League”, eastern-U.S. type campus. Cliff says, “It wasn't just building buildings. Physical improvements made it possible for programs to grow, and expand, contributing to the strength and recognition of the university's academic quality.”

The **University of the Pacific** recognized Cliff's contributions to the university upon his retirement, by awarding him the **ORDER OF**

**THE PACIFIC**, the highest honor the University can bestow on one of its own faculty or staff.

On July 4, 1954, Cliff married Dorothy Jane Coset. He has a daughter Claudia, born in 1957, who travels the Rotary world with him on speaking engagements when she is not teaching, and he has a son Cliff, Jr., who was born in 1962. He too [Cliff, Jr.] is a Rotarian. Sadly, Dorothy passed away in 1987. Cliff is now happily remarried to Mary Elena since 1994.

A \$30,000 grant to MNSI was initiated by Cliff.

## DC ELECT GERALD HARP HELPS ESTABLISH SCHOLARSHIP FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS ATTENDING THE UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark.

International undergraduate and graduate students looking to attend the University of Arkansas will soon have access to more scholarship money thanks to a generous \$150,000 gift from Gerald L. and Vicki Harp. Established in conjunction with The Rotary Foundation District 6110, the gift/award will be known as the Dr. Ben Saltzman and Mr. Jim Rountree Endowed Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship.

Dr. Saltzman and Mr. Rountree are both past directors of Rotary International and district governors of Rotary District 6110. Mr. and Mrs. Harp have chosen to honor these two Rotarians and their lifelong commitment to international understanding by endowing a scholarship through the Rotary Foundation that will benefit an international student attending the University of Arkansas.

"This is a wonderful opportunity the Harps have created for international students wishing

to learn more about American education and culture through study at the University of Arkansas," Chancellor John A. White said. "All of our students benefit from the diversity that a multicultural population brings to Fayetteville. There's much to be learned from other cultures through exchange programs and study abroad experiences. Thanks to the generosity of people like Gerald and Vicki Harp, these experiences contribute to the University of Arkansas' emergence as a nationally competitive, student-centered research university serving Arkansas and the world."

The Rotary Foundation's Ambassadorial Scholarships program is the world's largest privately funded international scholarship program and provides opportunities for more than 1,000 students worldwide to study abroad each year. The Saltzman and Rountree Scholarship will be designated as an Academic-Year Scholarship and will support a student for one academic year

of study at the University.

"The Harp family has maintained a long history of significant contributions to education throughout Northwest Arkansas, and along with the Rotary Foundation, we are grateful for their wonderful gift to assist the University in attracting international students," Vice Chancellor for University Advancement G. David Gearhart said.

This competitive scholarship will assist in building a bridge between Rotary District 6110, which includes parts of Arkansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Kansas and Rotary District 7020, which includes Anguilla, Bahamas (excluding the Great Bahama Island), British Virgin Islands, Cayman Islands, French West Indies, Haiti, Jamaica, part of Netherlands Antilles, Turks and Cacao Island and Virgin Islands.

The scholarship will be administered by the Rotary Foundation, with the understanding that the recipient will attend the University of Arkansas. 🌟

Club members are incredibly proud of their discovery. But, as no surprise to Past District Governor Bob Melott, club members are just as proud of their continuing service to their community. Melott says, "The club has 11 'Rotarians' and there are some clubs with 60 members **WHO DO NOT HAVE THAT MANY 'ROTARIANS'.**"

Rotarian Jerry DeLozier actually "found" the article while sifting through old papers in the club files. He commented, "It (the letter) really shows how humble and sincere Paul was. I just wish I could find the letter we sent to Paul so we could know the exact meaning of his reply."
