Thanks for a great year! Rotary in District 6110, stretching from Iola, KS to Booneville, Paris and Ozark in Arkansas, from Mtn. Home to most of eastern Oklahoma, 9 counties in Missouri and 8 in Kansas, has accomplished many great things.

It's been my pleasure to have served as Governor of a District with size and diversity, but also, with great traditions and the unique willingness and capacity to create new and innovative projects and programs. It's truly been my pleasure as your district governor, to have visited all of the clubs and to experience the enthusiasm, excitement and camaraderie.

This will be my last Governors message as the July Newsletter will become 2008–2009 District Governor Ron Petersen's and a new Newsletter Editors responsibility. This year we have accomplished a lot and some of the effort can be described now but some remains for the final statistics that will come after the year ends.

We will charter two new clubs before the end of the year. The Bella Vista Sunrise Rotary Club sponsored by Bentonville and the Alma Rotary Club sponsored by Van Buren.

We have chartered a new Rotaract Club in Tulsa; although community based it is centered around Tulsa University. Two new Interact clubs have been established in Pittsburg—sponsored by the Daybreak club and Sand Springs—sponsored by Sand Springs Rotary.

I am gratified that we have significant increases in attendance at significant events; The District Conference and the District Assembly.

Significant new ideas, projects, programs were presented at the September District Conference in Eureka Springs. The requirement that Presidents take seriously their job by attending PETS resulted in 74 presidents elects in attendance (as well as 19 President Elects for 2009–2010). I expect attendance will continue to increase because

Rotary's complex multiple programs require the attention of all officers of a our clubs.

Five Mini-Membership seminars were scheduled about the district and have resulted in significant increases in our membership (the final numbers will be forthcoming in July).

Solidifying the location of MAPETS (Mid-America President Elect Training Seminar) to Ft. Smith, in our district for the past 2 years and for 3 years forthcoming; I consider it a significant advantage to our membership in decrease travel time and expense.

The Tulsa club did a marvelous job as hosts for the visit of Rotary International President Wilf Wilkinson.

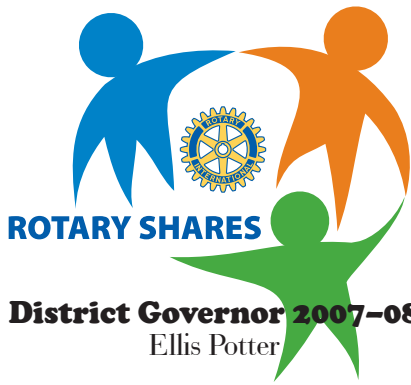
Our district supported one another during our own natural disaster with a significant Flood Relief effort to several of our own communities, Iola, Neodesha, Fredonia, Coffeyville, Bartlesville, Miami.

We reaped the bonanza of contributions to The Rotary Foundation three years ago, and were able to distribute a record number of significant grants to our member clubs. We were able to make record numbers of District Simplified grants and International Matching Grants. In addition, the foundation budget was large enough to be able to contribute \$50,000 of district designated funds to the Polio Plus effort. We were able to give two University Teacher Grants, a University teacher grant as well as continue with the Kirchner District Scholarship. We are continuing, with our fellow Zone Governors, an effort to endow a peace scholarship.

We have had a ground-breaking Friendship exchange that should pave the way for further one on one International Friendship visits.

We have broadened our horizons with our Group Study Exchange with successful interchange with District 4670 from Rio Grande do Sul in Brazil. We await the report of team leader Ken Colley when they return next month.

We have broken ground on publicity efforts by



Changing the Lives of Children One Smile at a Time

I want to tell you about 4 ½ year old Carla I met in Venezuela. Like many girls her age, Carla has dark hair and big brown eyes. But she had a bad cleft palate — so bad it made it impossible for her to speak. I want you to think about this. Imagine you had a daughter born with a cleft palate. Other children would shun her and the community would treat her as though she were retarded. Of course, if this was your daughter (or mine), you'd have her palate fixed with a simple surgery. But for girls like Carla, this is not possible. Her parents simply could not afford to have the surgery.

Now let me tell you what you can do for children like Carla. Our district has been involved with Alliance for Smiles since its first days in the fall of 2004. Alliance for Smiles is a non-profit organization that is sending medical teams to China for the purpose of providing free reconstructive cleft lip and palate surgery to poor children and working with local medical professionals to set up Treatment Centers for this problem.

Since its beginnings less than four years ago, Alliance for Smiles has a track record of success. Recently, I attended the Gala which was celebrating the upcoming surgery on its 1000th child. Since that Gala, the 1000th child did receive surgery and now Alliance for Smiles is facilitating its 13th medical mission to China.

Alliance for Smiles has its roots in Rotary. Its five founders are Rotarians, four of them Past Presidents of the Rotary club of San Francisco. The basic philosophy stresses the motto of "Service above Self" and in fact one of its photographers, Dave Fowler, a Rotarian from Nebraska won last year's Rotary photo contest for the best photo that illustrates Service above Self in the Rotarian magazine.

To date, Rotary Clubs from Chicago, New Jersey, Taipei, the San Francisco Bay Area, Hong

Kong and other areas have taken ownership in supporting missions. I feel it is time for our District to step to the plate.

I want to see District 6110 as the major Rotary sponsor for the fall mission to Huangshi China. The dates of the mission are October 25 to November 8, 2008. The Rotary cost for full sponsorship is \$80,000 and Rotarians will have a chance to actively participate in making a true difference in the lives of over 100 children.

I have gone on an Alliance for Smiles mission and have seen the fantastic results of the work of the plastic surgeons that Alliance recruits.

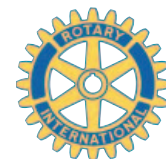
Fellow Tulsa Sunrise Rotarians Herb & Carol Orr and PDG Tom Clark have also been team members. I have been touched to see the reaction of the families to the life changing surgery. I want you to know that the families being treated are poor, that 85% of all people in China have no medical insurance.

Our work is needed. With the commitment to education and involving local medical professionals, the results will last longer than the surgical mission.

Rotary has only two clubs established in China. Alliance for Smiles is bringing the message of Rotary to China at the grass roots level so that when the government finally allows true development of Rotary in China, there will be a familiarity with our great organization and people ready to join.

Please join me in the effort to support this mission and spread the news of Rotary.

If you want me to come and speak at your club, I am more than happy to do so. I look forward to hearing from you. Rotarians can and do make a difference — just ask Carla.

The **Interact club of Southeast Kansas**, based in Pittsburg, is sponsored by the Pittsburg Sunrise Rotary Club.

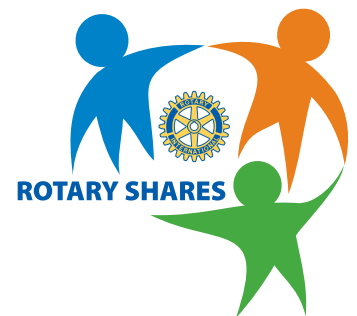
The **Interact club of Sand Springs** is sponsored by the Sand Springs Rotary Club.

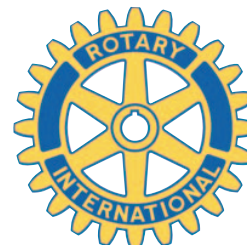

District Simplified Grants

District 6110 District Simplified Grants program has received over 38 grant request amounting to over \$53,000.00. So far we have approved 36 grants. As of April 25th, we have finalized 14 grants for \$17,772.00 and 4 more are waiting to be paid.

The DSG request have varied from, 6 clubs wanting help with the dictionary project, 4 clubs participating in the Choices programs, 3 clubs helping to replenish community food pantry, the Van Buren club purchasing audio/visual equipment for the community library, several clubs doing various projects to improve their community's

parks, fire rescue equipment for a community fire department, Ft.Scott purchasing a soccer score board for their soccer field, the 2 Joplin clubs purchasing equipment and books for a brand new Autism school.

The list goes on as to how our district's Rotary clubs are doing projects that will benefit their communities. This is all made possible by our supporting The Rotary Foundation. Every Rotarian Every Year.

Why Don't People Join Rotary? We Don't Ask Them!

“...the biggest reason why good people don't join Rotary is that we Rotarians don't ask them to. Oh sure, we ask our sons and daughters, our close business associates and friends to join sometimes, but we so often don't even think of our duty as (Rotary) advocates with most people we run across in our daily lives.

That doctor I met who had brought his club president into the world has, in 49

years of Rotary membership introduced only one new member into his club. He told me he had delivered about 1000 babies in his career. I think at least 10 percent of them would have been excited, elated and deeply honored just as his club president was, if the doctor who brought them into this world had invited them many years later to join Rotary. What a missed opportunity.” 

Sounding the call to Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Robert S. Scott has heard from Rotarians around the world who share his excitement about the push to end polio and want to know how they can help. Key to that effort, he says, is Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge, the three-year fundraising effort to match the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundations \$100 million challenge grant to The Rotary Foundation for polio eradication.

"Each Rotary club is being asked to contribute at least \$1,000 annually to the challenge for the next three years," says Scott, also chair of the International PolioPlus Committee. "If you consider there are nearly 33,000 clubs in the world, their combined fundraising efforts would result in almost the full matching amount of \$100 million."

All Rotarians are invited to participate in the challenge, especially those who have joined Rotary since June 2005, when the last commitments to the previous polio eradication funding campaign were fulfilled. Rotary clubs chartered since that time are also a special focus.

"PolioPlus is Rotary's only corporate program, and I believe that all Rotarians will want to share in the legacy of wiping out a disease that has caused so much disability and death worldwide," Scott says.

Although Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge began 1 January, contributions started coming in earlier and have been credited since 1 December

2007. Rotary has until 31 December 2010 to match the Gates Foundation grant. Contributions will be eligible for Paul Harris Fellow and other standard recognition, but no new recognition will be available.

Several resources are being produced to help Rotarians meet the challenge, including a DVD, PowerPoint presentation, brochure, and sample press releases. The tools will be available on the RI web site or from RI headquarters and international offices. A task force is also providing oversight and direction to clubs and districts.

"Many Rotarians are also asking if the challenge is designed to supersede **Every Rotarian, Every Year** and the Rotary Centers Major Gifts Initiative," Scott says. "The answer is no. Each effort is equally important, and Rotary is fully committed to funding all three.

Will the Gates Foundation grant and Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge cover the cost of eradicating polio?

"The \$200 million that will be generated will be a vital infusion of support for polio eradication," Scott says, "However, more will be needed to finish the job. I'm confident that Rotary will be the catalyst for national governments and other organizations to help fund the push to finish polio once and for all

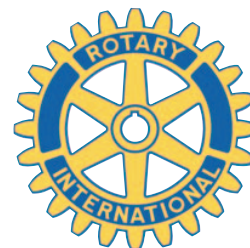

At last Wednesday's meeting, you heard from Past-President Rod Sands, who chairs the club's 2015 Rotary International Convention Exploratory Committee. It was a honor for us to be considered for this significant event, one that draws 20,000 to 40,000 delegates from around the world.

When RI President Wilf Wilkinson visited us last August, he was struck by Tulsa's vibrancy as a center of Rotary activity. We are certain it was at his urging Tulsa was considered as a potential convention host city, along with Dallas; Denver; Houston; San Francisco; Monterrey, Mexico; Sao Paulo, Brazil; and other Western Hemisphere cities — all much larger than Tulsa. And to be asked to bid for the year of our 2015 club centennial ... how appropriate!


Working closely for months with the Tulsa Metro Chamber Convention & Visitors Bureau, Rod's committee considered all ways to meet the minimum criteria of Rotary International.

The creativity and enthusiasm were infectious. Ultimately, we advised RI that while we thought we

could meet the hotel room requirements, we just couldn't come up with the public space, even with the new arena. Rod noted that if the

QuikTrip Center at the fairgrounds was located downtown, the space needs could have been met. Additionally, we would have had to raise \$2 million, a requirement that has led state legislatures to help out each city. RI lauded our efforts and enthusiasm, and still plans to consider our proposal, but it is likely that one of the larger cities mentioned will be selected.

But great news! Following Rod's report, Past District Governor Ed Hardesty announced that Tulsa has been selected as the site of the 2009 Rotary Institute. This week-long training event will bring together more than 400 district governorselect, district governors and past DGs. The incoming president of Rotary International will also attend the September 8-13 Tulsa event. More information to follow!

Marland's mansion in Ponca City (The founder of CONOCO, and former Oklahoma Governor) a couple of months back, I learned that the same architect that designed the mansion also designed the memorial that was built in honor of Will Rogers. With the knowledge gleaned from the colorful history of Marland, and the fact that Will Rogers was known to play polo on the grounds of the mansion in Ponca City, it only made sense that my next adventure should be to Claremore. Those that attended the 2007 conference know that the Director of Will Rogers' Memorial and Museum is District 6110 Rotarian Steven K. Gragert. He spoke at the conference in Eureka Springs.



Will Rogers became famous when Will, the Cherokee kid was performing at a round up at Madison Square Garden in New York. A steer got loose and made its way toward the audience and Will, highly skilled with a rope, was able to lasso the beast and saved many from getting hurt.

Will Rogers shot to the forefront of the American public. He became a humorist, syndicated newspaper columnist, Ziegfeld Follies star,

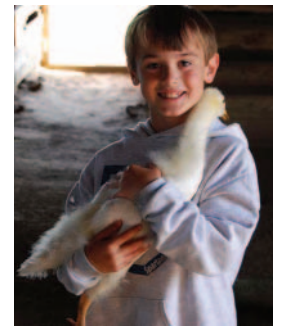


radio commentator, author, philosopher, philanthropist and starred in 71 motion pictures. He also was an adventurer and was a motivational force in bringing aviation to a point where it is an expected part of life.

Will Rogers was a person that could always make a person laugh and was talented at communicating ... making complicated subjects simple and funny.

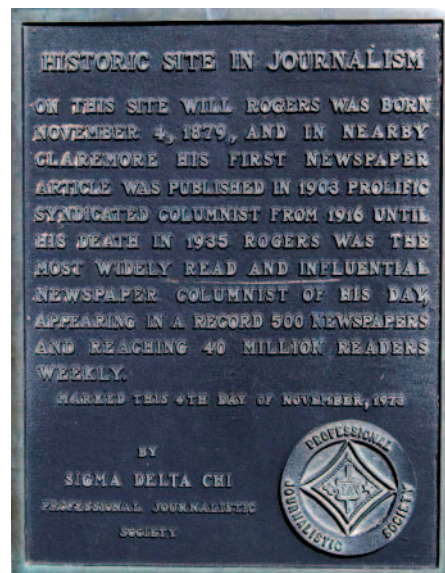

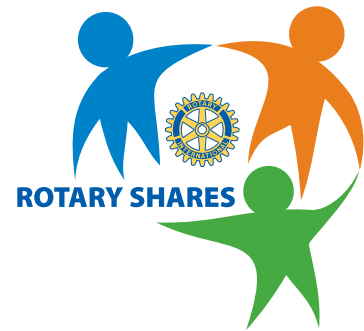

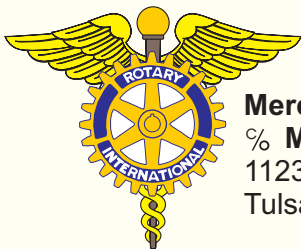
