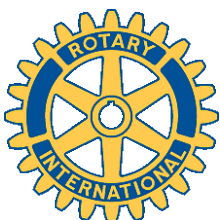

In recognizing Rotary's impressive fundraising success and steadfast commitment to polio eradication, Gates announced that his Foundation has decided to increase its challenge grant by \$255 million—for a total of \$355 million. By accepting the increase, Rotary also accepts the challenge to raise an additional \$100 million in matching funds by 30 June 2012 and drives the combined Rotary and Gates Foundation partnership's commitment to a total of \$555 million.

All of the resulting \$555 million will be spent in support of immunization activities carried out by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) in polio-affected countries. The initiative is spearheaded by Rotary, the World Health Organization (WHO), the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF.

In another welcomed development, the United Kingdom's Department for International Development (DFID) pledged \$150 million and the German government is giving an additional \$130 million, both to the GPEI. Contributions from the U.K. and Germany are separate and will not count toward Rotary's match of the Gates Foundation challenge grant.

The infusion of funds is crucial if the world is to finally be rid of polio, a crippling, sometimes fatal disease that poses the highest risk to children. Although the initiative has reduced the number of polio cases by 99 percent over the past two decades, the wild poliovirus still persists in four countries —

Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan — and imported cases from these endemic countries threaten other developing nations.

Your continued participation in this effort is crucial to making it a success. The Rotary International Board of Directors and the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation have unanimously agreed to accept this challenge grant to ensure the success of the PolioPlus program. Rotary and the Gates Foundation intend for their funding partnership to set an example for the rest of the world. We feel confident that this extraordinary partnership will serve as a catalyst for further donations from others to help us realize the dream of a polio-free world.

When Rotary entered the fight against polio in 1985, we promised every child a world free from the threat of polio. We are almost there. This funding agreement between Rotary and the Gates Foundation is a huge step forward, bringing us even closer to our goal. Success is our only option. Together we can *End Polio Now*.

WATER PROJECT UPDATE LED BY CLUB 2500, THE ROTARY CLUB OF TULSA

In preparation for our seventh successive year of drilling water wells in Nicaragua, the project shipped a 40' ocean container of drilling supplies, as well as a substantial quantity of used medical supplies and equipment for local hospitals in the country. The project continues to enjoy the partnership of the Rotary Club of Leon. The Leon Rotarians report that the trucks and drilling equipment have been serviced and are ready to begin drilling as soon as our driller, Mickey Moore, arrives in the country.

At the end of last years session we accounted for approximately 120 water wells drilled and we hope to complete at least thirty this year.

A contingent of Rotarians from the Tulsa Club, and perhaps from other clubs in the District, will travel to Nicaragua in late February. The purpose of the trip is to inspect this years progress, and to build stronger relations with the Leon Rotarians, as well as with people from our other NGO partners in NICA. A significant Rotary partner this year is the Rotary Club of Huntsville, TX.

Don't forget the sleeper in our district—MSNI—it is just one of the great projects of the Rotary World. Keep your community aware of the need for medical equipment and supplies!

The Literacy Council of Benton County recently held their second Scrabble Wars! Fundraiser. The event attracted about 180 people and raised more than \$15,000 without any large corporate sponsorships. With about 400 more points than the Wal-mart Team, the club fought and bought their way to a win. The Literacy Council of Benton County has 3 employees and about 45 active tutors. PDG Dick Trammel served as the Honorary Chairman of the event. Team leader was Harris McKee, current President of the Daybreak Club, and Literacy Council President.

Seven Habits continued:

VOCATION: They have respect for every vocation. Vocation and classification are the basis of Rotary. EMPATHY: They put themselves in the position of the other person, especially if the other person is in difficulty. They know that mere sympathy is never enough. They feel the pain and experience difficulties of others themselves.

IMAGE OF ROTARY: There may be moments when they feel that all is not right with Rotary. They may feel that there is 'politics' in Rotary. They know that there are some elements in Rotary who should not be there. They, however, look at the good aspects of Rotary. A Rotarian's Thoughts—by George R. Spence

Every year, RI has a slogan, established by the RI President, which serves as a theme for the year. The slogans are printed during the year in Rotary literature and when the DG comes to town, the slogan is usually expounded on and emphasized. Though I understand the reason for the slogans, I generally find them to be pat and not particularly motivating.

Not every year though—one year the slogan was "Mankind Is Our Business". I thought it was catchy. It succinctly stated Rotary's worldwide mission. I was fortunate that year to be given a Rotary pin with the slogan emblazoned on it, which I wear often.

But now, as Paul Harvey says—the rest of the story. I enjoy the Christmas season—the traditions, private and public, which go back to my childhood, and which I build on every year. One of those traditions is [A Christmas Carol](#), specifically the many video adaptations of the Dickens' story. I enjoy them all (though some more than others—I can do without [The Muppet Christmas Carol](#)).

Last year, trying to catch the 1951 version with Alistair Sim, I saw in close succession the recent Patrick Stewart version (very good) and of course the omnipresent 1938 version with Reginald Owen. Seeing them in close succession, I noted the subtle differences. This set me to wondering, in a fundamentalist mode of thought, what Dickens' original version said and how the adaptations might have changed its meaning.

I sought out and quickly located a cheap paperback version of Dickens' work, and I read it through. I did find some minor differences, though none so significant that they stuck with me. What did resonate however was something I had seen repeatedly on film, but reading it gave it a whole new significance.

In an early scene, Scrooge had arrived home and is seated before the fire having his evening gruel. The spirit of his deceased partner, Jacob Marley, comes to warn him of the fate that lies before him. Though initially taken aback by the presence of a ghost, Scrooge quickly acclimates himself to the spirit's presence. As Marley describes the horror of his afterlife and that the state of his existence was due to the way he carried out his life, Scrooge interrupts him, coming to his defense and exclaims, "But you were always a good man of business, Jacob."

Marley's ghost immediately retorts to Scrooge what are the key words of the story, "Business! Mankind was my business. The common welfare was my business; charity, mercy, forbearance, and benevolence were all my business. The dealings of my trade were but a drop in the comprehensive ocean of my business!" Reading this connected the Rotary slogan to its deeper meaning.

Whether the Rotary International President using these words knew it or not, he was giving us all an important message, one we need to hear and be reminded of from time to time. Marley tells us that mankind is our business. That much is simple and obvious. But taking the next step, it is vital to note that Marley's words to Scrooge (and to us) are not for the benefit of mankind, but for the benefit of Scrooge. Marley's plea that Scrooge make mankind his business is not to save mankind, but rather to save Scrooge—to prevent him from sharing Marley's fate.

We have all seen the movie, and we know what Scrooge does with what he learns. What will each of us do? Mankind is indeed our business.

ALLIANCE FOR SMILES REPORT FROM THE PHILIPPINES

The work of the Alliance for Smiles continues. Your district helped with the mission to Huangshi in October. We have just finished our first mission to the Philippines and the following report is from Alliance for Smiles Medical Photographer, Rotarian Dave Fowler from Nebraska. Santiago City, The Philippines

Nearly all of the children who come for cleft repair are young, 3 months to 10 years, and most of those are under 5. Bernie Villar was 22 and had lived all his life with an un-repaired bi-lateral cleft lip. That means he had two splits in his lip and he was so self-conscious that he never let anyone see his face. Our hotel owner, Noime, had employed Bernie at one of her farms and even she did not know until recently that he had a cleft deformity. If he wasn't looking down and hiding his face under his cap, he would hold a towel up to his face so nobody could see. Yesterday, Dr. Don LaRosa, renown plastic surgeon from Pennsylvania, repaired Bernie's lip and made him handsome—so handsome that Bernie didn't recognize himself in the mirror in the recovery room. His mother came into see him shortly after the surgery and even she wasn't sure it was her son.

Bernie still has a severe cleft palate that might be repaired on another visit, but for now, he is beginning to adjust to his new look. Because of his habit of being shy and hiding his face, all of the attention he got before and after surgery was

overwhelming. And, because 16 of his teeth had to be removed (6 the day before and 10 in the morning before he was taken to the operating room) so the surgery could be successful, he has a lot of healing to do. The healing will not only be on the outside but also on the inside. Bernie's habit of covering his face is so strong that he even covered himself while being wheeled from the recover room to the ward. That habit is going to be hard to overcome but, as soon as the ladies see him, it might change. He is now a very handsome man thanks to the volunteers from Alliance for Smiles.

The hotel staff hosted a banquet in our honor and there was more than enough laughter and tears to go around. Noime introduced each team member and asked each one to come to the front to share their thoughts about the mission. Then, she introduced 8 or 10 families she had arranged to be there, parents who brought their children who had received surgery at some time during the past two weeks. That really brought on the tears as we saw these little kids, one who was only 10 weeks old and whose parents had traveled 2 hours to get here.

But the highlight was one young man, 14 year old Daniel Padcayan, who had never been to school because of the ridicule he received. After all the speeches and tears and hugging the hotel staff started playing Karaoke and Jill, our dental hygienist saw Daniel sitting on the chair crying. She asked him to dance and that was when the fun began. It was like a butterfly emerging from a cocoon. Daniel turned out to be a dancing machine and before it was all over he was dancing by himself in the middle of the floor surrounded by everyone there, cheering and whistling and clapping their hands. And his father was there watching his son be the center of joyous attention for the first time in his life, and he was crying too. And, now I'm crying again as I write this.

This evening was the most emotional of any of the 7 missions I have worked. And, that's what makes all the work worthwhile.

Tomorrow is the final clinic. All the surgeries have been completed. All 117. We hope to see most of the patients again for the last time before we leave.

But, we'll be back again next year...
