GOOD NEWS for DISTRICT 6110!

Teddy Steen of the Rotary Club of Joplin, MO, and D6110's Public Relations Chair, has been successful in applying for and receiving a \$10,000 PR Grant from RI. Coupled with the required 1/3 match of D6110, she will set out to launch the plan proposed to RI to use the budget of \$13,333 to make "broad strokes" in the 4 corners of the four states. Watch for more billboards and TV utilizing the just released version of "Humanity in Motion" #5 to promote Rotary and end Polio NOW. In addition to the purchased billboards and TV time, her application to RI included a promised \$200,000+ of in-kind cable TV PSA time and hopes for the billboard companies to use the movable vinyl posters to post in-kind boards to fill unused space this year.

On the club level—putting Rotary in the public eye involves more than just writing press releases and maintaining contact with local media. Rotary International provides pre-produced public service announcements and encourages all clubs to localize these materials for use in their communities. Public Relations materials are available from RI by using the District web sites Public Relations link at www.ri6110.org.

Supplement the District placements by dovetailing your own clubs PR efforts! Consider cable and public-access television—ask the local cable operator for public access. Do billboards, posters, and signs. Use newspaper supplements, club brochures, presentations and speeches! (see page 2)

Beyond Traditional Media— Promoting Rotary in the 21st century means moving beyond traditional media. New technology hasn't made press releases obsolete, but it has added to the arsenal of media tools.

- Blogs are online journals that can include text, audio, video, and images. When the December 2004 tsunami hit Sri Lanka, the Rotary Club of Colombo Regency used a blog to collect donations and help coordinate relief efforts.
- A podcast is a digital audio file distributed over the internet, usually through a subscription-based service.
- Other new media tools include **electronic press releases**, distributed through e-mail and uploaded videos. More than 50 video uploading and sharing sites allow you to publicize your Rotary efforts on the web.

CELEBRATING ROTARY'S BIRTHDAY, FEBRUARY 23

I am writing to you today on behalf of Rotary's Public Image Resource Group to encourage Rotary clubs and districts to select a day and highlight Rotary's involvement in the local—and global—community. The Public Image Resource Group recommends Rotary's "birthday" on February 23 as an ideal date for several reasons. First, as Rotary's anniversary, February 23 allows clubs and districts a natural day to recognize Rotary's past, present and future. Second, the more clubs and districts around the world that celebrate Rotary Day on the same day, the greater the positive impact on Rotary's public image.

Yet, while publicizing Rotary on its February 23 birthday is ideal, any day can be identified as "Rotary Day" in your community. What is key is to plan a high visibility community service project or event for Rotary Day that helps to communicate what Rotary is and does with your community.

To help Rotary clubs and districts organize a celebration, here are three resources that are available for you and your district and club public relations committees:

**6110'S GSE TEAM
COMPLETES VISIT
TO JAPAN**

I spent the month of November 2008 in Japan. I got to climb Mt. Fuji (well, at least a little way as the best months to climb Mt. Fuji are July and August), I experienced four green tea ceremonies, enjoyed Japanese food (with chop sticks), lots of rice and drank green tea and sake, visited Buddhist Temples and Shinto Shrines, attended a score of Rotary club and district meetings, met with the Governor, toured the leading businesses and industries in the Shizouka and Yamanashi Prefectures (states). I saw where Commodore Perry landed on the Izu Peninsula in 1853 and opened the ports of Japan to the world. We met with a Buddhist Priest in the

Buddhist Temple where the negotiations to open Japan were held for several months. The area we visited is about 100 miles Southwest of Tokyo on the Pacific coast and has a very mild climate with natural scenic beauty. It is a very urban area. Each of four communities where we stayed had a population over 250,000. Most things were on a smaller scale including: people, cars, houses, yards, and even the leaves of the trees! The Japanese were very polite, patient, have a great work ethic, have an appreciation of their heritage, and enjoy the latest technological advances.

The Chairman of Rotary District 2620 GSE Committee, Tom Ikedo, made arrangements for me to visit three schools with over 200 students. They had a genuine interest in America and seemed to have at least a hundred questions. I took 50 letters from sixth grade students in Pittsburg, KS, and returned home with letters for all of them from students in Japan. They were written in Kanji and I needed the assistance of a Pittsburg State University student, Kohei Hoyashi, to translate them.

One of the best parts of the program was staying in the homes of Rotarians. I had five great host families who allowed me to experience Japanese family life. My first host family was what we think of as the typical Japanese family; grandfather and grandmother, daughter, son-in-law, and a three year old granddaughter, Rachimi. Her mother had read her the Wizard of Oz so she knew a little about Kansas. She called me Ken chan (which means my dear friend Ken).

It would take me a lifetime to fully appreciate the essence of the Japanese culture, but my month (see page 5)

PRESIDENTIAL CITATION REQUIREMENTS

Since one-half of our year is behind us, it might be handy to review the requirements for the Presidential Citation. The Citation is a wonderful way to thank your club's members for the work they have done in the year at hand, and to reinforce their pride in being a Rotarian.

To qualify for a citation, each club must:

1. Initiate a service project that will reduce child mortality.
2. Achieve a net increase of one member by March 31, 2009 (suggested goal: achieve a net membership increase of 10%).

3. Complete at least one activity from the lists in the Presidential Citation Brochure for each of the five service categories (Membership, Club, Vocational, Community, and International). Brochure at http://www.rotary.org/Rdocuments/en_pdf900a_en08.pdf.

The scope of the activities should be in proportion to the number of Rotarians in your club.

Requirements must be met, and the certification form submitted to the District Governor, by March 31, 2009. Certification form at http://www.rotary.org/Rdocuments/en_pdf/900b_en08.pdf.

[Rotary Day Proclamation](#) (.doc). A proclamation is an official recognition of a particular event or day. Often “proclaimed” by a government authority, the day is recorded in the public record and may be announced in such forums as a city council, provincial government or national parliament. This formal recognition also provides a good “news hook” for potential media attention. This proclamation sample can be tailored and sent to your local community, regional or national government decision-makers asking that a specific date—February 23 or another day—be named Rotary Day and declared an official day in your community.

[Celebrate Rotary Day Poster](#). To help promote the event in your community, two Rotary Day poster designs are available for districts and clubs to use. A graphic designer can modify the blank section or insert local photos. You can also print the poster out as is and write in local event information. The poster is designed so that it can stand alone, if needed.

The Rotary International Board of Directors adopted “enhance the internal and external recognition and public image of Rotary” as the No. 2 goal in its Strategic Plan. Think of the impact of everyone celebrating Rotary Day together! Best wishes as we Share Rotary to *Make Dreams Real...*

In May, The 5 finalists attend District Assembly to present speeches— the winner receives \$1000, runner-ups receive \$350.

RYLA NEWS

District Rotary Youth Leadership Awards Camp is taking shape under the leadership of Mike Rogers. Dates for this year's 18th annual RYLA camp are March 26,27,28 and 29 and will be held at the Salvation Army's "Heart O' the Hills" facility located outside Tahlequah, OK. RYLA is specifically designed for class leaders in their junior (11th grade) year of high school. If your club is hosting a student from a foreign country, he or she may attend the RYLA camp as long as the individual is attending high school (10-12th grades) and has the permission and participation of the sponsoring club.

Please note camp starts on Thursday afternoon at 1 PM and runs until Sunday afternoon at 12:30 PM.

The cost is \$260 per student and will include all meals, snacks, lodging, seminar activities and materials, a ROPES course, entertainment, a dance and other activities/items. Clubs will need to provide transportation to and from the campsite near Tahlequah. **There is always a need for Rotarians and their spouses to serve as cabin chaperones. There is no cost to chaperones (except their time and transportation) as expenses are covered by fees charged sponsoring clubs. Clubs are encouraged to participate by providing cabin chaperones or by attending any phase of camp activity. There is NO charge involved for Rotarians, spouses, or cabin chaperones. The counselors, who will work directly with the students, will come from the various Universities within District 6110.**

\$100,000 CHALLENGE UPDATE

In December, 2007, Rotary International was issued a \$100,000 challenge to help in our final battle to wipe out Polio from Bill Gates and his wife, Melinda. Rotary accepted the challenge and asks that each Rotary Club in our District contribute at least \$1,000 each year for three years. Hopefully, quite a lot of this money will come from community fund raisers to spread the participation more broadly.

As of November 7, 2006, it was recorded that District

6110 raised \$57,344.13. If you take \$100 x 3 years x 79 clubs, you will see that our minimum goal should be \$237,000 so we are at about 24% of achieving this mark. Unfortunately, 6 clubs make up \$39,887.48 of the money raised, so we need other clubs to step up to the plate. I single out Fayetteville, Springdale, Tulsa, Muskogee, Sand Springs and Eureka Springs for their efforts thus far.

You can make a difference in a young person's life. If I can be of help with any fund raising efforts or ideas, please let me know.

More on Previously Reported

Stock Market Declines

You have likely read about the securities fraud committed by Bernard Madoff. Through one of its hedge fund managers, the Foundation had minor exposure (less than 0.1 percent of the Foundation's total investments) to one of Madoff's investment vehicles. TRF is working with their independent investment consultants to minimize this loss and reduce Rotary's risk in this area.

The current investment climate continues to present challenges to our organization. Since 30 September, Rotary International's General Fund declined as well as The Rotary Foundation's investments (except for the Polio Plus Fund) also has experienced declines in line with the markets.

As we previously reported, nearly all losses to date are unrealized (i.e., due to declines in the market prices of the securities held and would be realized only if the securities are sold). Because Rotarians have continued to pay their dues on time and make generous contributions to the Foundation, we have not had to sell any of our investment securities to meet operating expenses.

Investment earnings, and if necessary, operating reserves, are used to fund a portion of RI's operating expenses, and all of the Foundation's operating expenses. While RI's reserves remain above the Board's targeted level, (*see next page*)

the Foundation's reserves have declined significantly below the level required by the Trustees. Therefore, the Board of Directors and The Trustees of the Rotary Foundation, and the secretariat staff, have been reducing spending.

As noted in previous communications, Rotary's senior leaders, the Financial Services staff, and Rotary's investment consultants continue to closely monitor the financial markets and will take all possible steps to ensure that Rotary remains financially strong in this difficult economic environment.
