FOUNDATION MONTH

In exchange for living here on this earth, I believe we must “pay rent” by giving back. The Rotary Foundation is used by many Rotarians throughout the world to make our dreams of Service Above Self a reality. In 1917, Arch C. Klumph, Rotary's sixth president, proposed to the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, Georgia, USA, the creation of an “endowment fund for Rotary—for the purpose of doing good in the world in charitable, educational, and other avenues of community service.” A few months later, the endowment received its first contribution of \$26.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City, Missouri. In 1928, when the endowment fund had grown to more than \$5,000, the fund was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International. Five Trustees, including Klumph, were appointed to “hold, invest, manage, and administer all of its property, as a single trust, for the furtherance of the purposes of RI.” Two years later, the Foundation made its first grant of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The ISCC, created by Rotarian Edgar F. “Daddy” Allen, later grew into the Easter Seals organization. It was a beginning.

Those among us today, who can see the humanity, humility and honesty of the man nominated to become the International President in 2010-11, with hindsight, can appreciate that the first Foundation alumnus to come full circle from scholar, through Rotary, to president, has always shown those qualities of leadership that earmarked him for his present rise to eminence.

Ray stands on the shoulders of some very fine leaders and his experience and 3-H qualities mentioned above are set to take our organization to new heights. We never knew it at the time, but we have always needed him.

How many of the fine Foundation alumni, showing outstanding leadership qualities in their current jobs, are not Rotarians? How many future presidents of Rotary

International have we allowed to slip through our fingers for the want of asking them to join Rotary?...

If you cannot be bothered to recruit alumni for the sake of Rotary, do it for yourself. The reason we do volunteer work is the same as why we bring flowers to a friend in the hospital, or buy a special gift for a special person in our lives: it makes us happy. Sometimes, in fact, being kind and considerate to others actually benefits us more than the people we are helping. Even if our activity starts out as an obligation, rather than something from the heart, it can become a joy to us, as well as those who benefit from our efforts. I am reminded of what Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote: "Happiness is a perfume you cannot pour on others without getting a few drops on yourself".

To those Rotarians all those years ago, who, for whatever reason, recruited Ray Klinginsmith, an alumnus of the Foundation, to Rotary, you have come up smelling like roses and attracted more than a little happiness...".

THE MUSEUM OF NATIVE AMERICAN ARTIFACTS

THE BENTONVILLE/BELLA VISTA DAYBREAK ROTARY CLUB HELD ITS REGULARLY SCHEDULED THURSDAY MEETING AT THE MUSEUM RECENTLY. DAVID BOGLE, AVID COLLECTOR AND OWNER, BEGAN THE TOUR WITH DISCUSSION OF THE MUSEUM'S CHRONOLOGICAL ARRANGEMENT BEGINNING WITH THE EARLY PALEO ERA AND MOVING THROUGH THE ARCHAIC, WOODLAND, MISSISSIPPIAN AND HISTORIC PERIODS. BOGLE DISCUSSED HISTORIC CIVILIZATIONS OF THE CADDO AND OSAGE TRIBES AND THE SUPERIORITY OF POTTERY PRODUCED FROM ARKANSAS CLAY.

BOGLE THANKED MIKE MALONEY, A DAYBREAK ROTARIAN, FOR HIS VOCAL AND ORGANIZATIONAL CONTRIBUTION TO THE MUSEUM'S AUDIO PRODUCTION. BOGLE'S PRISTINE COLLECTION IS A RESULT OF MEETINGS WITH RANKING MEMBERS OF THE OSAGE AND CADDO TRIBES, PERSONAL ACQUISITIONS AND DONATIONS FROM NOTABLE CONTRIBUTORS SUCH AS DR. CHERRY OF SPRINGDALE AND DR. WESTBROOK OF LITTLE ROCK. ADDITIONALLY, BOGLE'S MUSEUM PROVIDES A HOME FOR UNIQUE COLLECTIONS FROM THE FORMER UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS MUSEUM, AND HISTORY BUFFS WILL APPRECIATE THE LIMITED-ENGAGEMENT ROTATING COLLECTIONS.

AT THE ENTRANCE, VISITORS ARE AWE STRUCK BY THE ENORMOUS MASTODON CAST SKULL, A SPECIES OF ELEPHANT THAT DISAPPEARED ABOUT 10,000 YEARS AGO. WOOD DISPLAY CABINETS PAINTED IN DEEP TERRA COTTA TONES RUN FROM FLOOR TO CEILING WITH CLEARLY MARKED PLAQUES AND AUDIO SUPPORT. HAND-LOOMED WOOL BLANKETS DOMINATE THE CONFERENCE AREA, TAXIDERMY DISPLAYS ARE SCATTERED THROUGHOUT THE HALLS AND CUSTOM-DESIGNED MURALS PAINTED BY KELLY GREEN RECREATE THE DAILY ACTIVITIES OF TRIBAL MEMBERS. ARROWHEADS AND RUGS, POTTERY AND TOOLS, HEADRESSES AND ART, WAR AND CEREMONY CLOTHING ARE ASSEMBLED FOR THE EDUCATION AND ENLIGHTENMENT OF ALL AGES.

THIS MOST THOUGHT-PROVOKING LOOK INTO HISTORY AND EARLY MAN APPEARS TO BE A LIFE-LONG MISSION; HOWEVER, ROTARIANS WERE STUNNED TO LEARN THAT BOGLE PURCHASED HIS FIRST ARROWHEAD JUST SIX YEARS PRIOR TO OPENING THE MUSEUM. BOGLE WAS INSPIRED AND ENCOURAGED BY THE LATE JOHN FRYER, HIS SCOUT MASTER AND EAGLE SCOUT MENTOR. WHILE BOGLE HAS ALWAYS ENJOYED INDIAN LORE AND LIFE, THIS MUSEUM GOES BEYOND MERE CURIOSITY INTO A MYSTERIOUS OBSESSION.

WITH ENTHUSIASM, THE BENTONVILLE/BELLA VISTA DAYBREAK ROTARIANS JOIN BOGLE IN PROMOTING THIS ELITE COLLECTION FROM THE STATUS OF "BEST KEPT SECRET" TO A DISTINCTIVE DESTINATION FOR BOTH LOCALS AND TOURISTS. Maija Wallace is from Eureka Springs and is our student ambassador to Bolivia this year. She has flourished in Bolivia, a country which for a month this fall was in a critical political crisis including a shutdown-the-country transportation strike. For Maija, the consequences of dealing with the crisis included being house bound for several days and having school canceled for 2 weeks. Ultimately a group of South American presidents brokered an agreement between the states and the central government.

During the entire crisis, the Rotarians on the ground in Bolivia, together with the husband of a Fayetteville Rotarian, monitored the students, reported on their status to the USA Rotarians, and developed alternative routes for extracting the students should that move have become necessary.
