Welcome to 6110 President Devlyn

Rotary International President Frank J. Devlyn will spend February 7 in our district participating in two Rotary meetings, helping break ground for a Serendipity Learning Center at Celia Clinton Elementary School, and viewing the District 6110 Medical Supplies Network.

"It promises to be a very festive day," Governor Don Wasson says.

"President Devlyn has traveled the world this year," Governor Don says, "but I think he will really be excited to see what we're doing here in service in our clubs, our community and our world. President Devlyn's theme *Create Awareness – Take Action* could have been written right here!"

Frank Devlyn is president of Devlyn Optical group of Mexico, a manufacturer, distributor and retailer of optical products. He grew up in Juarez, Chihuahua, Mexico, and in El Paso, Texas. His college degree is in Business Administration from Instituto Panamericano de Alta Direccion de Empresas in Mexico City.

A Rotarian since 1970, President Devlyn is a member of the Rotary Club of Anahuac in Mexico City. In 1996 he served as aide to RI President Herbert Brown. Mr. Devlyn is recipient of The Rotary Foundation's Distinguished Service Award and Citation for Meritorious Service in recognition of his support for its international humanitarian and educational programs.

The Wednesday-noon luncheon will be attended by more than 500 Rotarians, according to Assistant Governors Tom Clark and Grant Easterling. Reservations have been coordinated through the Rotary Club of Tulsa's office, headed by Executive Secretary Margaret White. Clubs made their final reports to Ms. White on Friday, February 2. President Devlyn's personal aide will be PDG Don Walker.

Hundreds of hours have been spent since requests were first made to President Devlyn's staff requesting the visit to District 6110. Tulsa Club President Tom Rinehart and District Governor Don Wasson blazed the trail in Buenos Aires in June 2000. There will be a complete report in next month's newsletter detailing all the people involved.

Who are these Asst. Governors?

Our vast district has 15 assistant governors. Their tasks are to consult with club leaders prior to the beginning of each Rotary year, and to make at least four follow-up visits during the year. They help the District Governor arrange special meetings and they are also a direct link of communication when the need arises.

This month's two featured AGs are **Glenn Fisher** from Oswego and **Douglas Stuckey** from Pittsburg. (Doug pronounces his name stu-u-u-key.)

Doug has been a Rotarian just over five years now. He was a charter member of the Pittsburg Sunrise club and served as president in 1998-99. Part of his reservoir of talents presents a dichotomy in that he is both a journalist and CPA. Doug served as Bulletin Editor during the years 1996-99 and continues to prepare press releases about the activities of the club in Pittsburg.

Doug also serves as an advisor to Sigma Chi Fraternity, and his 19-year CPA practice specializes in audit and tax accounting with some consulting thrown in. Wife Cathy and daughter Maggie (8-years-old) also participate with Doug in the Little Balkans Festival, United Way and PSU Community Campaigns.

Doug serves Pittsburg, Frontenac, Pittsburg Sunrise, and Webb City-Carl Junction Rotary Clubs.

Glenn Fischer's Postmaster duties haven't deterred him from serving his club as president two different time (one for a 2-year period). Recently Glenn has been District Newsletter editor, and was a member of the All-Rotarian GSE team to Ukraine, Russia in 1999. In the spring of 2000 he was GSE team leader to Eastern Russia and Siberia.

When Glenn is not Postmastering, Rotarying, or GSEing, he runs a laser engraving business from his home. "I'm just about getting too big to operate from the house," Glenn says. He also enjoys gardening, yard work and hunting. Glenn serves Coffeyville, Nowata, Miami, Oswego and Parsons Rotary Clubs.

"Despite everyone's best intentions, projects are not always successful"

MSNI (Medical Supplies Network, Inc.) has unanimously voted to withdraw all matching grant applications to The Rotary Foundation to benefit Venezuelan Rotary projects. This affects more than 35 clubs in District 6110 who were asked to sponsor Matching Grant applications distributed to them in December for the benefit of disaster victims in Venezuela. The Spanish-version applications detailing MicroCredit Banking aid for mudslide victims from December 1999 caused many club presidents to ask questions of PDG Bob Melott and MSNI Director of Operations Larry Biron.

The decision by the board of MSNI was made for three primary reasons:

1. The first, and most important, is that a request was made by CITGO Petroleum and their mother company, PDVSA Venezuela, to immediately release the funds to the Venezuelan Red Cross for disaster relief. CITGO was primarily responsible for these funds being made available to MSNI;
2. Our inability to receive matching grant applications from Venezuela in a timely manner caused numerous delays in the release of these funds;
3. Upon review by The Rotary Foundation of the matching grant applications received in December from Venezuela, we were notified that they were lacking the necessary information for their approval causing additional delays.

In the letter to all participants in the failed project, Biron thanked all for their willingness to participate. "It is unfortunate that we were unable to process these applications in a timely manner, and we apologize for any inconvenience this has caused you," Biron concluded.

"Unfortunately, despite everyone's best intentions, projects are not always successful," Biron said.

CITGO/PDVSA had given MSNI over \$527,000 in April of last year to allocate – with help of the Matching Grant process – help for Venezuelan victims of the hurricanes which devastated Caracas and adjoining areas in Venezuela. The money was held in trust – in an interest bearing account – and all of the principal and interest was returned to CITGO for distribution to the Red Cross, Biron said.

I was in Kampala (Uganda) 1st-14th January, 2001. Aside from visiting Rotary clubs, I was concerned at the undue delay in handing over and distribution of the medical supplies for the Ebola outbreak. I am pleased to report that concentrated action through liaison at the highest level of Customs Authorities and Health officials etc resulted in release of the 2 x 40' Containers of Medical Supplies from the bureaucracy of "red tape" entanglements.

It was my pleasure on behalf of all of you and R. I. in particular to officially hand over the medical supplies to the Director General of Health Services of the Uganda Government.

The handing over was witnessed by members of the local as well as international media. The local TV station as well as the press highlighted the event. PDG Sam Owori heading the Ebola task force committee shall file a detailed report and photographs to cover the event.

Thank you once again most sincerely for your pro-active action towards a most commendable Humanitarian effort.

The Path of Peace

(Excerpts from President Frank's monthly message to Rotarians around the world)

This month, we commemorate a very special anniversary . . . the birth of Rotary on 23 February 1905, known as World Understanding and Peace Day. During Rotary's 96 years of existence, we have accomplished milestones in service that even founder Paul Harris could not have envisioned during his lifetime. We have provided educational opportunities for thousands of international scholars, provided health care to tens of thousands of needy people, and made possible the immunization of millions of children against the crippling disease of polio. In less than the span of a century, we have forged a powerful force for peace, built on the foundation of service.

. . . This month I encourage you to *Create Awareness and Take Action* through the programs of Rotary to bring peace to the world. It may sound like a monumental task but it is achievable in small steps. By taking these steps, you will continue a noble journey that began with one man, Paul Harris, nearly a century ago.

Long way to go & a short time to get there

There are a couple of new columns of information in this month's attendance report.

They represent Rotary Foundation giving to the Annual Programs Fund (APF) during 1999-2000 vs 2000-2001.

To repeat the words in that famous song, "We've got a long way to go and a short time to get there," may tell the whole story as the district reaches to meet its goal of \$160,000 in giving to the APF of the Foundation this Rotary year.

"I am really encouraged by the stories I hear about fund-raising efforts for the Foundation," Governor Don Wasson said. "I know that many clubs are working very hard to meet their personal goals."

Contributions to the Foundation through November are \$23,360.01.

During each visit to the 77 clubs in the district, Governor Don stressed his belief that each member of Rotary should contribute \$50 this year. "I almost am on bended knee," the governor said over and over, "asking you to help Rotary complete our 20-year efforts at eradicating Polio from the world."

District Foundation chair John Brodbeck addressed the Bartlesville Rotary Club on Feb. 5 about how small amounts of dollars do miraculous things when contributed to The Rotary Foundation. The Foundation committee is available to present programs anywhere in the district, Brodbeck said.

Historically, many clubs have already collected monies for The Foundation and transmitting those funds takes place in the spring. Reports from Rotary Foundation also lag "so we know there are more funds in the pipeline," Governor Don said.

Will Rogers Club begins second half-century of service

Tulsa Will Rogers Rotary Club members celebrated 50 years of service on January 15 and defined where they want to go in the next half century. Governor Don Wasson presented a specially prepared certificate from Rotary International commemorating the event and took a little kidding from the club for "talking longer than two or three minutes."

Past presidents talked of "the way it used to be," charter member Hal Sundvahl (the only still-active charter member) thanked countless Rotarians for their service, and PDG Lloyd Stevens (now deceased) received many accolades for his service to the club and to Rotary International.

Current President Lee Griffin thanked the Rotary Club of Tulsa for relinquishing territory so the new club could be formed in 1951, Past President Dale Watt passed the opportunity to talk, but Past Presidents Dick Tuebner, Charles Ward and Jim West spanned the years of the '70s and '80s with recollections. West even brought his scrapbook to substantiate those remembrances from his year as president in 1974-75.

Rotary Foundation chairman John Mount made a "pitch" for participation by club members in the work of Rotary and had willing participants before the meeting ended.

Even though the club met on the "holiday" commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, attendance was surprisingly good, President Griffin commented.

Rotary Scholars studying in USA, Canada, England and Scotland

Rotarians in District 6110 are hosting two and have sent three Ambassadorial Scholars to universities around the world this academic year.

Kristin Pickell, Pittsburg, KS is in Toronto, Canada, studying on a District Kirchner Scholarship. John Coyle, Tulsa, OK is at Cambridge, England and Shawn Johnson, Ft. Smith, AR is studying in St. Andrews, Scotland. Coyle and Johnson are recipients of \$25,000 grants for their year as ambassadors and students from our district. Pickell's stipend is \$15,000.

"We just awarded \$65,000 in scholarships to some really great young students," PDG Dave Baker is quoted as saying in August 1999, following interviews on the Pittsburg State University campus. Today Pickell, Coyle and Johnson are carrying on the tradition of being Ambassador Scholars. The funding from District Rotarians prepares them for future leadership roles in our society.

Districts in other parts of the world – Suriname and Japan – have sent scholars here. Maureen Goeldjar and Seiji Kadowaki are both in Tulsa. Goeldjar, from Suriname, is studying at Oral Roberts University; Kadowaki is studying Near-Eastern Archaeology at Tulsa University.

Harrison, AR President Marcille Lawrence asked early in her year of service for an explanation about The Rotary Foundation, Governor Don Wasson recalls. "This Ambassador Scholarship program utilizes almost half of the money contributed by District 6110 Rotarians," Wasson notes.

Our district Disaster Relief team is working overtime this year because of earth quakes in El Salvadore and India. Death tolls (estimated as high as 25,000 in India) continue to rise. If you're looking for a 10-for-1 return on your investment, PDG Dave Baker recommends you look into contributing through DRI (Direct Relief International) in California. They – in conjunction with District 5240 – are preparing to ship \$2.5 million in supplies to India. Rotarian Charles Campbell, Broken Arrow, is reporting good news. "I got a note from Adriana Varille, president of the Matamoros Rotary Club, and she informs me that the Minister of Health for Mexico has been in Matamoros and has Oked all the medical supplies (currently stored in a warehouse there)." Adriana visited the Broken Arrow club recently. Charles goes on to say that the supplies will cross the border duty-free – and more importantly – the visit by the Minister of Health will help cut through the red tape to get other shipments across the border. This is really significant as District 6110's Medical Supplies Network is in the final stages of receiving hospital equipment and supplies from a 19-story hospital that is closing in Memphis. Much of the equipment will be going to Mexico. We'll have a story in next month's issue about RI President Frank Devlyn's visit here and how MSNI is responding to his request for medical supplies for Red Cross hospitals in Mexico.

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"Other than the Near-Eastern project, I took two classes of other subject they are about archaeology of American Southwest, and a pottery analysis," Kadowaki commented. "Both subjects were unfamiliar to me, but the classes were so interesting that I got many ideas which may be applied to Near Eastern archaeology, my major. I have gotten 'A' for all three classes." Seiji's sponsor is Charles Shannon, Tulsa Sunrise Rotary Club.

Coyle's itinerary follows scholar activities and speaking engagements at various Rotary Clubs in Cambridge. "My impressions of England have been overwhelmingly positive thus far. My experience at Emmanuel College here in Cambridge has been spectacular – Emma, in short, ROCKS! The people I have met (from all over the world – I can count among my friends men and women from Korea, Japan, Australia, India, New Zealand, South Africa, Italy, France, Germany, Latvia, Spain, Greece, and Finland) have been equally impressive."

Coyle concluded his required report by saying, "I cannot thank Rotary enough for giving me the chance to do everything that I've had the opportunity to do thus far . . . and the year is not even a third over! I have a feeling that I might run out of positive adjectives before my time here is up." Coyle is enrolled in the Masters' Program of European Studies at Cambridge.

Shawn Johnson, as other scholars have noted, is impressed with his Rotary sponsor in Scotland. "Rotarian George McIntosh met me at the airport," he reports. He goes on to tell of a talk he gave at his host club, the Rotary Club of St. Andrews that meets at the St. Andrews Golf Hotel. Johnson also included a photo, showing him dressed in Scottish kilts, on the famous bridge at the St. Andrews golf course. Johnson's curriculum is focused on Medieval History.

"My special topic is 'Law and Society,' and my dissertation topic will rise out of it. Hopefully, my study of the Common Law, which the United States uses, will help me in law school in the States next year. . . . The British education system has been a nice fit for me." Johnson worked in Washington, D.C. for two years before seeking the Ambassador Scholarship. Many of the questions he is asked to answer concern the past presidential election, he says.

Marueen Goeldjar is now finishing her year in the district. She participated at PETS in March 2000 and has attended many Youth Exchange functions. Her sponsor is Dr. Dave Connor, member of the Tulsa Southside club.

Kristin Pickell, daughter of Pittsburg Sunrise Past President George and Carolyn, has now been appointed to a Teaching Assistant job in the graduate school at University of Toronto. Her master's thesis will be to construct an ankle-foot orthosis for children with cerebral palsy and spina bifida. Kristin's interactions with other Ambassador Scholars has been uplifting to her, her family reports. "We are very happy for her."

Pickell lists two pages of activities involving athletic, scholastic, community service, Rotary, and other volunteer efforts. Kristin is being hosted by Don Valley Rotary Club member Dierdra Gibson and helped the club serve poor, emigrant families in the Toronto area. On a lighter note she says she enjoyed Rodgers and Hammerstein's *South Pacific* presentation with Dierdra and her family.

Scholars for year 2001-02

Marueen Rose McClung and Matthew West Ragland will be Ambassador Scholars in the academic year 2001-2002. McClung is from Eureka Springs, Ragland from Fayetteville. They were chosen during interviews in August 2000.

McClung will study at University Of Otago, Dunedin, New Zealand, District 9980. Ragland has been accepted at Universidad de Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico in District 4150.

EUREKA SPRINGS, AR is bringing many of its members to President Devlyn's visit in Tulsa Feb. 7. President Rusty Windle, secretary Willie Nemece, treasurer Mary Ellen Sheard, plus PDGs Dave and Jane Baker, John and Marilee Brodbeck. Also making the trip will be Dr. Bob Messer.

BERRYVILLE, AR will honor four of its members with Paul Harris Fellowships at festivities in Eureka Springs on Feb. 15. President Mary Lou Harp has invited Eureka Springs Rotarians to join in the event. Governor Don and Shirley Wasson will also join the celebration. "I was overwhelmed by the need for the basics of life," Lawanda says of the visit to Philippines.

LAMAR, MO President-elect Mike Gage will be attending PETS in Searcy, AR in early March because of a conflict on March 23-24 when all other District Presidents-elect will gather in Springdale, AR for PETS and District Assembly. Mike will be joined by **EUREKA SPRINGS, AR** incoming president Bruce Knapp.

MIAMI, OK Rotarians have contributed \$100 to the Rotary Club in Irkutsk-Baikal, Russia, for a project to help an orphanage in that Eastern Russia city. The need for this project was highlighted last year when the GSE team from District 6110 spent a month in that part of Russia, according to Glenn Fischer, team leader, Oswego, KS.

VAN BUREN, AR club members have final approval from the Rotary Foundation for a \$20,000 project to feed and clothe children in an orphanage in Malawi, Africa. Participating with the Van Buren Rotarians is the Rotary Club of Limbe, in Blantyre, Malawi. The concept for the project came from A. C. Moncrief, district trainer, who spent 2 years in Malawi in the Peace Corps in the early 1960s.

PRYOR, OK President Jack Hatzenbuehler had a terrible encounter with a Skill saw and his right hand at the end of last year. He is now recovering and is excited about coming to the President Devlyn evening event at Gilcrease Museum on Feb. 7. Club secretary Cathy Webster also had surgery earlier in this year to remove part of her foot. First part of our Four-Way Test asks, "Is it the truth?" This story, though unfortunate for both Jack and Cathy, is true.

SOUTHSIDE TULSA, OK is often said to be the "best kept secret in District 6110." This year under leadership from President Richard Booth, the club has raised \$50,000 to grow its club foundation to \$225,000, given \$2,100 to its adopt-a-school families who needed help at Christmastime, given \$10,000 to Project HOPE, and adopted two Uganda orphans. Gayle, widow of Past Governor Skip Kriedler, traveled hundreds of thousands of miles supporting Skip's speaking engagements around the world of Rotary. Rod Smith, chair for the induction, said Skip had spoken to more than 450 Rotary clubs. Gayle now lives in Tulsa and said "this is home" during ceremonies at the club.

NEVADA, MO is going to celebrate two birthdays and the formation of a new Interact Club on February 23. First birthday is the club's 75th; and #2 is the birthday of Rotary. There'll be a special section in the newspaper, Rotarians from adjoining clubs are being invited to the affair at Cottey College. The charter from Rotary International for the Interact Club of Nevada will be presented by District Governor Don Wasson. Part of the special newspaper section will feature a story about Past Governor Ben Saltzman. Dr. Ben's influence as a Rotary Director eventually led to the 3-H program and the Polio-Plus initiative to eradicate polio from the world.

MOUNTAIN HOME, AR will celebrate Valentine's day February 16. Featured speaker will be PDG Charles Laine from District 6760, Franklin, Tenn. Governor Don and Shirley Wasson will also join in the day's activities including presentation of a \$1,000 C.A.P. Matching Grant from the Rotary Foundation to help purchase a small transport trailer and freezer for the Mountain Home Food Bank.

BRISTOW, OK will celebrate its birthday on February 15. The club will be 75 years old. Reflections from past presidents and Past District Governor Levan Kelly ('67-'68) will be the program. A specially-created certificate from Rotary International will be given to the club by District Governor Don Wasson.
